PURPOSE:

The course is designed to provide the student with a survey of selected contemporary social problems. Social problems addressed in the class may include poverty, addiction and substance abuse, mental health, violence with a focus on family violence, crime, teen sexuality and pregnancy, and health care issues. The causes, severity, and consequences of the selected social problems are explored. In addition, social welfare strategies for alleviating social problems are presented.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

At the end of the course each student should be able to:

- 1. discuss the nature and severity of selected social problems facing society using a sociological perspective.
- 2. identify the multiple causes and consequences of social problems.
- 3. critically evaluate the effectiveness of various social welfare strategies to alleviate the causes and consequences of social problems.
- 4. write more effectively.

CLASS PREREQUISITE/COREQUISITE:

Students enrolled in Sociology 251 must have completed LS 225 (*Research Skills for the Behavioral Sciences*—1 credit hour) with a grade of "C" or better **or** be currently enrolled in LS 225.

CLASS FORMAT:

Materials are covered primarily through lectures and reading the class textbook. Students are expected to attend all class sessions and be prepared to discuss assigned readings. Lectures may be drawn from assigned readings and outside materials; as such, failure to attend class will more than likely have an adverse impact on students' grades.

REQUIRED READINGS:

Macionis, John, 2010. *Social Problems*. Fourth Edition. Prentice Hall Publishers. On sale in the college bookstore (ISBN: 0-205-74900-3).

Other assigned readings can be found on Blackboard in the *Learning Modules* tab. Be patient as it takes some time for the longer readings to download.

GRADING SYSTEM:

Students will complete <u>two</u> examinations and a final examination during the semester. These will be in-class examinations. Tentative dates for the examinations are **February 21** and **April 10**. The final examination is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **May 9**, **10-11:50**; the final examination will not be comprehensive. The two examinations and final examination will comprise **45%** of the final grade. **Examinations will consist of short answer and objective (multiple choice, matching, and true/false) questions and will test content covered in class lectures and assigned readings.** Make-up examinations will not be given unless an excused absence is provided; without an excused absence, a grade of <u>zero</u> will be recorded for the examination.

Students will complete **five** outside-of-class quizzes during the semester. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped and **25%** of the final grade will be based on students' scores on their **best four** quizzes. Each quiz will consist of 50 multiple choice questions will cover material from the required Macionis textbook. The quizzes can be found under the *Assessment* tab in Blackboard. Students will have 90 minutes to complete each quiz. The schedule and deadlines for the quizzes are as follows:

Quiz 2 (Chapters 6&11 Macionis): To be completed by Tuesday, February 14, Noon

Quiz 4 (Chapters 4&9 Macionis): To be completed by Tuesday, March 27, Noon

Quiz 5 (Chapters 7, 10&12 Macionis): To be completed by Thursday, April 26, Noon

Twenty-five percent of the final grade will be a written research project. A description of the **Social Problems / Issues Research Paper** is attached. Students should notify the instructor of their topic by **February 16** and the completed exercise is due **March 8**.

The remaining 5% of the final grade is based upon the following:

-Participation in class exercises and assignments including the **Student Data Sheet**.

-Class attendance: Students are allowed <u>three</u> unexcused absences during the semester; three or fewer unexcused absences will net the student a total of 90 points. The <u>fourth</u> unexcused absence will reduce the total to 45 points and <u>five</u> or more unexcused absences will result in 0 points for attendance. Excused absences will <u>not</u> count against the student; excused absences are only those provided in writing by the Dean for Student Affairs (Richardson Hall 234; phone 587-7221) for happenings such as illnesses, family or personal problems, or athletic and academic events.

IMPORTANT NOTE ON PLAGIARISM: If you plagiarize someone's work (i.e., turn in the same paper that someone else has turned in, if you quote sentences from another source without using quotations and citing the source, or if you turn in a paper that is not your individual, independent work for this specific class), you will receive an automatic ZERO for that portion of the grade. If you do it again, you will FAIL the course. In addition, any assignment completed for this course should be independent and a unique paper just for this class. You cannot turn in work that is or has been completed for another class or that is part of another class's assignment. ALL RESEARCH PAPERS WILL BE SENT TO turnitin.com TO CHECK FOR PLAGIARISM.

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SOCIAL PROBLEMS / ISSUES RESEARCH PAPER (25% of Final Grade)

The purpose of this assignment is to intellectually explore a social problem/issue that is of interest to you. Using class lectures, assigned readings, or your personal experiences and interests, select a topic and write a **four** page (minimum of four pages), double-spaced paper (font 12 in Arial or Times New Roman style). In addition to the four pages of text, each paper should have a cover page (containing the title of paper and name, phone number, and e-mail address of the student author) and a references page.

Use a minimum of <u>three</u> journal articles, <u>one</u> book, and <u>one</u> research-worthy website as the basis for the paper. **Do not** use popular magazines, newspaper articles, encyclopedias, opposing viewpoints books, the course textbook/assigned course readings, or the instructor's lectures as references. Please rely strictly on academic materials for references.

The paper <u>must</u> follow the following format using the <u>specific major topic headings</u>:

- 1. **INTRODUCTION** (clearly state the social problem under consideration and its extent and severity).
- 2. **CAUSES AND/OR CONSEQUENCES FOR SOCIETY** (what are the causes of the problem and what are the negative consequences for individuals and society).

Text citations and references should use the American Sociological Association (ASA) format. Hints on writing effectively and clearly, editing, and referencing and citing in American Sociological Association (ASA) style can be accessed through the Nielsen Library's homepage: click on *How do I...? Guides* and then *Write Citations in APA, MLA & Other Formats*, then on *American Sociological Association*. **PLEASE TYPE ALL TEXT CITATIONS IN <u>RED</u> SO THAT THEY CAN BE MORE EASILY IDENTIFIED.**

Very Important: Keep Xerox copies of the reference materials that you use in the paper. This means copies of the periodicals, chapters from books, and website materials used in writing the paper. The instructor reserves the right to require students to produce these materials upon request.

Always use your own words to describe others' ideas and give credit to the authors for their ideas by citing them in the text of the paper; all ideas must be cited and all citations must be referenced on the reference page. Do not extensively copy an author's material verbatim or with minor changes; this is technically cut-and-paste plagiarism and is profoundly unacceptable.

ALL RESEARCH PAPERS MUST BE SUBMITTED TO turnitin.com TO CHECK FOR PLAGIARISM; the password is soc251 and the class ID is 4638284.

In addition for this assignment, <u>do not</u> use the direct quotes of others. Use only your own words.

Remember that a research paper is not an opinion paper; it should reflect the documented ideas of scholars and academics studying and doing research on social problems not your own personal opinions. Your personal opinions are very important but are not an appropriate part of the research paper process. As such, references to the first person such, as "I and we" are not appropriate in research papers.

Finally, make it easy on yourself by conserving words and using short and to-the-point sentences; such sentences make it easier to check for verb-noun agreement.

The grade on the **Social Problems/Issues Research Paper** will be based on the following evaluations:

- -the intellectual depth and quality of the paper
- -the selection of appropriate and quality research information (journal articles, books, and Web information)
- -the quality of the writing (proofreading, editing, and organization/presentation of ideas)
- -the degree to which the instructions regarding the exercise are followed (format; cover page, non-use of direct quotes)

Students should inform the instructor of their topic by *February 16*. The final draft of the **Social Problems/Issues Research Paper** is due on *March 8*. In addition, an electronic copy of the paper must be submitted to *Turnitin.com* by class time on *March 8*.

Some specific factors to consider in terms of possible points lost are summarized in the following table:
